

Ag Spotlight: *Meet Lazy Squirrel Acres*

Like many other families during the pandemic's stay home order, James and Christie Gillen, stayed safe and healthy by ordering and having groceries delivered.

Frequently they found that the produce they were receiving was of poor quality or not available at all. James started looking into other options for fresh produce either from local farms or growing

it themselves and stumbled across microgreens. "This type of farming had a great appeal to us since the labor was minimal, the crop turn-around time was fast, there were a variety of new flavors and extreme levels of nutrition" says Christie. An overabundance of microgreens shared with family and friends who raved about the quality lead to the creation of Lazy Squirrel Acres, LLC.

As a completely home-based operation, the husband and wife team run the business out of their home in Naperville. Each family member serves an important role in their success. James does most of the planting and harvesting, while Christie takes the microgreens to farmers markets where she meets potential customers including local chefs and restaurant owners. Their two children also take part in the business as taste testers and food critics. Christie says, "They usually argue about eating all their vegetables, but have no objections to adding micro-

greens to their meals."

As with any farm operation, growing microgreens comes with many challenges. Getting consumers to realize that microgreens are not



"just a garnish or a starter plant" says Christie, is one of the first obstacles. She explains, "The nutrition from these micros can be up to 10 times higher in nutrition density than the full

grown version. We've had to educate many new and potential customers about "the why" and that they should consider trying microgreens." The positives to growing these microgreens seem to outweigh any challenges they face. Since they are grown vertically in an environmentally controlled room there is no need for soil or the use of fertilizers or pesticides. Seeds are carefully selected and equipment is properly cleaned and sanitized. "We follow strict sanitation protocols and use the highest quality filtered water, seeds and substrate," explains Christie.

The future of this small business is promising. They started Lazy Squirrel Acres out of a personal need to provide their family with healthy food in uncertain times. It was happy surprise to provide local residents with fresh and healthy options with microgreens. "They are easy to add to the diet you are already eating. We put them on pizza, tacos,

macaroni and cheese to name a few. It adds flavor and beauty to your meals while also adding vitamins and nutrients," says Christie. And since these microgreens are grown indoors, they are able to supply them year-round!

Turkey & Wild Rice Soup

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- ½ large yellow onion, diced
- 3 carrots peeled and chopped
- 1 rib celery diced, optional
- 1 cup uncooked wild rice or a wild rice blend
- ¼ teaspoon baking soda
- 1 tablespoon fresh thyme leaves
- ½ cup dry or semi-dry white wine (a good, drinkable wine)
- 4-5 cups unsalted chicken or turkey broth, divided
- 1½ teaspoons kosher salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 3 cups cooked chopped or shredded turkey (white & dark meat)



INSTRUCTIONS

Heat a large Dutch oven over medium heat and add butter and oil.

Add onion, carrots, celery and uncooked rice. Cook 6-8 minutes or until the vegetables have softened and the rice begins to pop. Stir often.

Add baking soda, thyme and wine. Cook 1 minute, stirring often.

Add 4 cups broth, salt and pepper and bring mixture to a boil. Reduce heat to low, simmer and cover. Cook, covered, 30 minutes. Check the rice and if it isn't softened, cook an additional 10 minutes with the lid on.

Remove the lid, add cream and turkey and cook 30-60 minutes or until the soup reduces and thickens.

(If the soup is too thin, whisk in 2 tablespoons flour or cornstarch that has been mixed with ¼ cup cold heavy cream. Bring just to a boil, reduce heat to low and cook until soup has desired consistency.)

(If soup is too thick, add an additional 1-cup broth.)

Season to taste with kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper.

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Women's Corner by Carol Bohnert

Since Abraham Lincoln's proclamation on October 3, 1863, the fourth Thursday of November has been celebrated as a national holiday in the United States. Named "Thanksgiving Day," the holiday has changed in food and activities over the years, but "thanks-giving" is still the rationale for the holiday. How did the idea of our Thanksgiving originate?

Historical records indicate the first Thanksgiving in the colonies was a three day harvest celebration in Plymouth Bay, Massachusetts in 1621. The people involved were the English settlers, known as the Pilgrims, and the Wampanoag Indian tribe. Squanto, a Wampanoag Indian who was kidnapped by Englishmen years earlier, is believed to be the one facilitating the friendship.

Chief Massasoit had signed a peace treaty with the Plymouth Pilgrims in 1621. As a result, the Indians and Pilgrims celebrated the first Thanksgiving together. The Pilgrims were celebrating the survival of a brutal winter in a new country and a successful harvest. The Pilgrims indeed benefitted from the planting techniques and new crops introduced by the Indians. The three day harvest festival in 1621 featured a variety of foods. Some writings suggest the food menu included venison, lobster, shell fish, berries, fruit, and squash. Some legends include wild turkey on the menu.

Moving forward from 1621, historical accounts indicate that harvest celebrations continued in the midst of hardships and survival challenges. In the mid-1800s, Sarah Josepha Hale, an American writer and activist, became an influential voice for social issues. Her famous nursery rhyme, "Mary Had a

Little Lamb," gave her name recognition to the public. She campaigned on the social front for a national Thanksgiving holiday. Sarah's persistent campaign for 36 years caught the attention of President Abraham Lincoln during the Civil War era. Desirous for unity among the states, Lincoln found Hale's concept of a national Thanksgiving holiday appealing. In response, President Lincoln directed the Secretary of State, William Stewart, to draft a document titled "A Day of Thanksgiving and Praise." President Lincoln signed the proclamation on October 3, 1863. The first official national Thanksgiving was therefore celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November, 1863.

Activities and events noting Thanksgiving have evolved over the years since 1621, but the concept of thanks-giving still defines the holiday. The ritual of celebrating with food continues, however, this year's

Thanksgiving season may be different than what we traditionally have known. Many people are facing difficult challenges because of the COVID-19 pandemic. This, for numerous people, may include dealing with food insecurity. Remember the basis of the first Thanksgiving, of being grateful for survival and the successful harvest of food? The people, Indians and the Pilgrims, helped each other. How can we help each other in this COVID-19 Thanksgiving season to have food for all? Helping each other is not limited to only adults and their innovation. I am reminded of an 11 year old boy who volunteers at the Northern Illinois Food Bank for its distribution programs two or three times per week.

Are there people in your neighborhood/surroundings that are facing food insecurity this season? How can you help? What will you do for "thanks-giving" in this 2020 Thanksgiving season?



A time to celebrate family, food and its affordability

To my surprise, our son recently announced how much he loves Thanksgiving. Keep in mind, this comes from a kid who started his Christmas wish list in August. For a couple weeks this fall, he and his sister discussed whether our 10-month-old farm dog should dress as a delivery driver or a hot dog for Halloween.

So, Thanksgiving? He says this holiday of thankfulness starts with a cool parade on

TV. We spend the day with cousins, and the food is "really, really good." I agree, and it rates one of the most affordable for many reasons: No gifts, simple decorations, and comfort food at a comfortable price. In fact, the ingredients to make the classic Thanksgiving meal cost about \$50 for a gathering of 10 people, according to the American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF). For 35 years, the nation's largest farm organization has calculated the cost of the classic fixings of turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a veggie tray, pumpkin pie, coffee and milk to be under \$5 per person. AFBF even predicts leftovers at that bargain price.

Most fast-food meals cost more than that. Our family's Thanksgiving likely does,

too, as we traditionally exceed the meal's basic menu requirements. Then again, every household participates to share in the expense. My sister-in-law's cheese ball shaped as a turkey makes a festive appetizer. My aunt pan-fries sweet potatoes to a delectable glaze laded with margarine and sugar. While green in color, my grandma's pistachio pudding layer salad certainly doesn't meet the universal definition of salad. Yet in good-old Midwestern fashion, we treat it like a salad in the food line despite the whipped topping. Then, we have dessert, too.

My British brother-in-law loves Thanksgiving for layered pumpkin-pecan pie. His parents like it, too, and sometimes visit from England during this traditionally Ameri-

can holiday. They like how the celebration brings family together for a combination of great food and company without the obligations and pressure to purchase presents. Still, they bring us boxes of British chocolates.

Our son's favorite part of the meal is turkey with Grandma's dressing. Our daughter loves Granny's butterhorn rolls. My tastebuds like everything, including a dollop of homemade cranberry sauce that took me nearly 40 years to appreciate. Kudos to my son for appreciating the simplicity of this holiday so young. If I can only get him to crave the cranberries earlier in life than me.
