

In honor of Earth Day, students learned about natural resources including soil, air and water, conservation techniques on the farm, and how they can conserve natural resources at home. We learned what soils are made of and why they differ. 
Elementary! Pramisha's design has been made into a bookmark that will be used for DCFB summer events and at the Membership Appreciation Dinner.

Weather demands resiliency, binds farmers everywhere

We mount rain gauges on various fenceposts for measuring rainfall totals. My brother can cite the exact date of the previous year's last freeze of spring and first freeze of fall as if they were birthdays. And I would predict an 80% chance of weather talk at the dinner table with my family.

Weather binds farmers from coast to coast and generation to generation. Since farming began, this single variable impacts everything from morning chores and mental states to profitability and table talk. Rain makes grain, and wind can take it down. We mow hay when the sun shines, yet never

rule out an irritating pop-up shower before the forage is baled. When the weather threatens or improves the global supply of food and fuel, the commodity markets react.

Data shows that over time weather comes with greater variability and extremes from cold to hot and dry to wet. Since 1980, the number of days it has rained more than two inches has doubled in Illinois, a statistic cited in a new docuseries at *WatchUsGrow.org*. More rain in a shorter time can trigger crop losses and soil erosion, but farmers have adjusted to protect crops and the environment. More than ever on our farm and farms across the state, grass filter strips along streams, fields of cover crops and reduced tillage practices slow and filter water flowing across the land. In fact, Illinois farmers and landowners have dedicated more than 800,000 acres to land and water conservation.

Technology significantly advances resiliency on the farm. On our smartphones,

we view subscription weather forecasts and field-specific precipitation totals. From tractor cabs, we watch live radar images for rain that threatens fieldwork. Bigger or faster planters plant crops quicker, and high-capacity combines gather more crop during windows of favorable weather. Tile drainage systems improve water management within fields. Even the tedder, a farm implement that aerates mowed hay, helps hay cure sooner to bale before a rainfall that could spoil it.

We talk to neighbors about the ground's frost

depth in winter, the soil temperatures in spring and the field-to-field rainfall differences by summer. Those same friends understand the deafening yet therapeutic sound of a much-needed summer rain on the metal roof of the farm shop without discussion. But, several surely will call or text after they've seen the rain gauge.

Ag Spotlight: Meet Frank Keller, Keller's Farmstand

Farming in the Keller family originates back to the first farmland purchased in 1852 for dairy farming. When Frank Keller IV was born, his family moved and purchased land to begin grain farming. Dedicated to learn more about farming, Frank attended Joliet Junior College where he studied Ag Production and Grain Production. After college, the lack of available farmland to start his own farm led him to serve in the Peace Corps in Lesotho, Africa. There he learned about farming and growing vegetables as an extension agent. He also helped local farmers learn new skills for growing bigger and better crops. Upon returning home, Frank began to seek out resources to start farming at home. His mom, a DCFB Women's committee member, was an excellent resource. The original owner of Sonny Acres, Ramona Feltes also provided valuable information about planting and which crops would bring in customers. "Starting with sweet corn would always bring people in and then they shop for other vegetables," says Frank.

In 1991, Frank began growing homegrown vegetables and opened his first vegetable stand on a cart in the Naperville farm driveway on 95th Street, and Keller's Farmstand was born. As business picked up, he built a small farmstand and, years later, expanded to the large farmstand still standing on its original farm soil.

As with most urban farming, land developments meant big changes in the late 1990s when plans for a four-lane highway to connect Naperville and Bolingbrook cut through the middle of the farm.

The Keller family decided to acquire land in Oswego, now the largest farmstand, to make up for the loss of the home farm in Naperville, keeping one acre to allow the Naperville Farmstand to remain on the farm prop-

erty. You can visit farmstands in Oswego, Naperville and Plainfield.

Keller's Farmstand is the true definition of a family business ... "Continuing on through generations" is just one of the most satisfying aspects of the farming business ...

Keller's Farmstand is the true definition of a Family business. Frank's sister, Laura, runs all social media, and his sister Martha runs the Naperville market and flower business. His brother runs the Oswego market, bakery, and is his partner in all production. His daughters also help out at the Oswego farm with the orchard and fall festivities. His son helps with the harvest and vegetable production. His father, Frank III, and Uncle still take part helping run the harvester. "Continuing on through generations" is just one of the most satisfying aspects of the farming business for Frank. "It's great that family wants to carry on through the season and business changes," says Frank.

Farming in our harsh variable climate can prove challenging. Frank notes, "Every year there are 2 or 3 major weather events that have a major impact." An early frost on apple trees that have started to bloom can wreak havoc. Some years are better than others and the farmstand is also tasked with educating their customers. "People don't realize how weather based we really are. When they see it at the supermarket, they

think it is always available." Even with the challenges, Frank says he "wouldn't trade it for anything!" He finds it incredibly satisfying to see his customers blown away when they see first-hand what farm fresh fruit

growing and they continue to convert more of the farm into specialty crops. The Oswego Farmstand is the home farm where all the bedding plants, sweet corn, vegetables, apples, and pumpkins are grown. This is also where they host all of their Fall Festivities on weekends in the fall: pumpkin patch, corn maze, wagon rides, farm animals, and more. The apple orchard houses 9,000 apple trees with pick-your-own beginning in late August.

The farmstand in Naperville is open now for business with flowers, vegetable plants and perennials and the Plainfield farmstand will open mid-July for sweet corn season. For more information visit kellersfarmstand.com.


