Ag Spotlight: Meet Samantha Panock

Growing up, Samantha always felt connected to nature, whether she was camping or hiking in forest preserves or studying earth science and horticulture in high school. It is no surprise, then, that she majored in Environmental Science, "I wanted to be a part of the efforts to save our planet, and make it a greener place for generations to come," said Samantha. This career path also has so many avenues to discover, from working in the lab, in government, at a non-profit, for a business or even as a research assistant at the Morton Arboretum. "It never feels like you are working when you are passionate about your career," says Samantha.

After two years with the Morton Arboretum, Samantha is still passionate about her research. "I get to work with so many super smart people of all different backgrounds and expertise," she said. They have specialty labs (like soil lab, root lab, and conservation lab) all working together toward the common goal of protecting nature and trees. They collaborate on data, plan projects, conduct analyses, use similar equipment and methodologies. Her research also helps inform providing clean air, shelter for animals and beauty for the world is truly remarkable. But all of that does not come without challenges. Most research conducted runs on "tree time," says Samantha. "Research takes

the arborists on best tree care practices and management. Arborists provide tree care assistance to large scale entities like a government agency and small scale entities like homeowners. The field of Arboriculture is just another example of a career path someone could choose as an environmental scientist. Other related careers could include: horticulture, ecology, biology, engineering and agriculture.

For Samantha, the most satisfying part of her work is "Knowing that I am making a difference in the world! I am leaving my mark and creating a greener future

for generations to come." Knowing that what you are working on and planting today will be around for decades to come years of patience and trial and error. There are always times when sensors don't work in the field or results of a project are not what we hypothesized. But we keep on learning and studying hard!"

Environmental Science is a growing field and one

County, State Fairs Promote Farming, Family, Fun

The Start of County Fairs
In the early nineteenth
century, agricultural reform-

ers in northeastern United States organized exhibits that would promote farm-



Dollars to donuts: The great State Fair returns

We park the van, help the kids set up 4-H exhibits and make a beeline to the donut stand. Through the glass display in the mobile food trailer at the Illinois State Fair, we watch a machine pump out mini rings of donut batter into what resembles a lazy river of hot cooking oil. The donuts sizzle as they move along the channel of oil before a turner flips them to fry the opposite side. A worker coats the donuts in granulated sugar and serves them in quantities as large as commemorative plastic pails.

We own two and bring them to every Illinois State Fair for bargain fill-ups.

The mini donuts, the pork burgers and a towering cup of soft-serve ice cream from the Dairy Building will feel extra special this August, which marks two years since the fair's return in Springfield. We're ready. We haven't seen enough food on sticks nor a life-sized cow carved from butter in 730 days.

During a typical visit, we entertain ourselves with experiences related to agriculture and natural resources. Our family watches a bit of the hog show and browses displays of fruits and gladi-

oli stems with prize-winning rosettes. We take in a draft horse competition while sipping a lemon shakeup and wishing Illinois were less humid. Despite the August heat, educational exhibits and political parties set up camp. Landscapes of blooming flowers beautify the 366-acre fairgrounds, ample space that allows residents to break from the norm. Visitors can view the birth of piglets or shoot a bow and arrow under supervision, all at the Illinois State Fair.

Modern farm machinery lines the street leading to the Commodities Pavilion. our family's favorite lunch space for Illinois-raised pork, beef and lamb. At some point, we venture over to Conservation World where the kids view tanks of local fish species and learn about the mussels they find in the river that borders the farm. A tractor-pulled tram takes us back to where we started, ready to collect the kids' 4-H exhibits and ribbons.

We depart with tired feet, full bellies and family memories without even experiencing the grandstand events, carnival rides nor twilight parade that kicks off the 11-day event. My heart sings a bit of the soundtrack from "State Fair," an old musical with good advice. "Don't miss it; don't even be late," or the donut line will be long.

ing ultimately leading to what has developed into the modern county fair. It included livestock judging, plowing competitions, and exhibits which showcased new agricultural implements and techniques. Today's fairs have similar aspects including livestock shows, exhibit halls, carnival rides, food stands, and other large events like tractor pulls and concerts.

The History of the Illinois State Fair

In 1853, the first Illinois State Fair was held in Springfield, Illinois and created to promote not only the improved methods of agriculture and raising livestock, but also displays of improvement for labor, industry, education, arts, and sciences. At the time, admission was only 25 cents. Over the years, the Illinois State Fair has been held in 12 different cities across the state including: Chicago, Alton, Peoria, Freeport, Jacksonville, Decatur, Quincy, Ottawa, Du Quoin, Olney, and Centralia. In September of 1894, it landed its permanent home in Springfield where it ran

for six days. The fairgrounds currently cover over 366 acres with the annual fair running for 11 days. Each year the Illinois State Fair welcomes hundreds of thousands of visitors experiencing everything that the fair

has to offer.

Showing & Judging Livestock

For years, showing livestock has been a great way to showcase an animal's



characteristics and qualities. This includes an animal's ability to convert feed, pass on desirable traits, or care for an offspring. Annually, livestock producers enjoy showcasing their hard work and their genetics for the coming year at livestock shows. Often these shows are located at county and state fairs. The youth you see in the show ring dedicate many hours to take care of and work with their livestock throughout the year all while developing a strong work ethic, integrity, and responsibility.

Master Showmanship Contest

County fairs across state annually hold Master Showmanship livestock contests, where exhibitors are evaluated on their knowledge on and ability to show three species of animals: beef, sheep, and swine. Most exhibitors are

used to showing only one or two species of livestock, so the Master Showmanship contest is an opportunity for them to demonstrate their ability to work with multiple species of animals – all with

Green Infrastructure Solutions Aim to Protect Water Supply

A highway of subterranean pipes channel fresh water to and sewage away from Illinois' homes, businesses, schools and parks. Pipes also carry runoff from rainstorms and snowmelt. This runoff includes pollutants swept away from parking lots, construction sites, and streets, potentially poisoning the waters and habitats crucial to wildlife and plants.

Illinois' 155 lakes and 87,110 miles of rivers and streams are vulnerable to the impact of runoff. The Illinois Climate Assessment indicates Illinois is experiencing more extreme weather, including more rain water in a shorter period of time, combined with longer periods of summer drought and higher temperatures.

Infrastructure to move that stormwater, located under roads, is aging and unable to keep up with increased amounts of water. Many communities are turning to innovative solutions that not only help manage stormwater, but give people parks to play in and habitats for birds and butterflies.

Green stormwater infrastructure uses plants and other techniques that mimic nature to slow stormwater and let it infiltrate in place rather than pooling where it becomes a nuisance.

"Green infrastructures are a great tool for communities," says Lisa Merrifield, University of Illinois Extension community and economic development specialist. "It is usually much cheaper than replacing underground pipes."

Green infrastructures may • appear as a garden, brick parking lot, or plant-covered

roof.

"Managing stormwater may be the reason communities turn to green infrastruc-

ture, but beautification, livability, and even social justice are co-benefits that make the strategy a really attractive option for communities," Merrifield says.

To help communities maximize the benefits of green infrastructure, Illinois Extension experts are collaborating with Illinois Indiana Sea Grant professionals, the North Central

Region Water Network, and other state Extension and Sea Grant programs.

"Our goal is to connect Extension professionals, so we have the latest science and technology to support real people in real communities," says Merrifield.

Collectively, this group, the Green Infrastructure Community of Practice, is working to share and crosstrain Extension and Sea Grant professionals on models, methods, and tools to understand and assess green infrastructure and stormwater issues, including outreach to community leaders, business owners, K-12 teachers and students, and others.

The group also aims to help communities:

- understand and use green infrastructure to minimize stormwater runoff and its potential impacts to the built and natural environment.
- maximize the societal co-benefits associated with green infrastructure,

including environmental literacy, workforce development, and diversity, equity and inclusion.

 be more responsive and resilient to environmental and population changes over time.

"The Green Infrastructure Community of Practice is an invaluable resource for Extension and Sea Grant stormwater professionals," says Eliana Brown, Illinois Extension water quality specialist. With a background in stormwater engineering and over 15 years of experience in stormwater management, Brown has witnessed both success stories and lessons learned from green infrastructure installations.

Green infrastructure provides opportunities to increase the quality of life for people in neighborhoods. Many communities increase their use of green infrastructure after a major environment or regulatory event. For example, Peoria began a comprehensive program in 2013 in response to interactions with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Since then, the city has completed nearly 30 projects and currently budgets about \$1 million each year for green infrastructure, choosing to do so because they believe it will be more cost effective in the long run.
