Holiday Cacti are Low Maintenance, Winter-blooming Gifts

With their vibrant,
floral displays and lowmaintenance needs, holiday
cacti are a great holiday gift.
Thanksgiving, Christmas, and
Easter cactus are each different species. They bloom
reliably each year without
much upkeep.

"Every December, one plant in my office comes to life despite the minimal care it receives," says Kelly Allsup, University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator. "The plant has remained in the 6-inch pot for nine years now, receives water when it is dry, and has been used prolifically in propagation workshops for Master Gardeners."

Holiday cacti are easily distinguished by the stem margins as well as timing of flowering. These cacti don't have true leaves; instead, they have flattened stem segments that are used in propagation to grow new plants.

Illinois Extension Horticulture Educator Jenifer Fishburn says holiday cacti are the gift that keep on giving.

"They are often passed down from generation to generation as family heirlooms because they are so long-lived," Fishburn says.

Thanksgiving cactus, Schlumbergera truncate, has two to four saw-toothed projections resembling crab claws. Flowers are produced from late November to late December. Flower colors include white, red, lavender, salmon, orange, and yellow.

"Thanksgiving cacti are often forced into bloom and sold at Christmas time, and are often misnamed Christmas cacti," Fishburn says.

Christmas cactus, Schlumbergera x buckleyi, has scalloped or rounded stem margins. Flowers are generally showy from late December through March. The flowers form at the tips of segments.

Easter cactus, Rhipsalidopsis gaertneri, has four to six rounded teeth along the stem edges and brownish hairs at the leaf tips. Flowers in shades of pink or



red flowers appear March through May. Easter cactus may re-bloom.

Thanksgiving and Christmas cacti blooms are triggered by day length. They bloom when they receive 12 to 15 hours of darkness a day for five to six weeks and are exposed to cool night temperatures.

Holiday cacti are commonly used to demonstrate propagation because leaf cuttings, rather than stem cuttings, can be used to generate new plants. However, cacti do not have true leaves. The leaves are actually stems called cladophylls.

Despite being a cactus, these plants are native to the tropical rain forest and are watered regularly with other houseplants. Water cacti when the top inch of soil is dry to the touch.

To gift holiday cacti, look for 4, 6, and 8-inch pots at garden centers. Find a decorative container with a hole in the bottom of the same size. Remember these cacti are long-lived and can thrive in this pot for the next 15 years.

When transporting cacti, wrap and bag plants to prevent exposure to cold temperatures as the buds will be severely damaged by time spent outside.

Holiday cacti can bloom profusely for a month or two and may even bloom twice a year. While in bloom, use cacti as decoration, keep them away from heat sources, and water regularly.

As a houseplant, place in

front of a window and water regularly. In the summer, these tropical houseplants can go outside in a partially shaded area. Between April and October, fertilize every four weeks with a complete houseplant fertilizer.

Italian Sausage Rigatoni with Spicy Tomato Cream Sauce – Easy, hearty, delicious pasta dinner to please everyone!

Prep Time10 mins, Cook Time20 mins, Total Time30 mins, Servings: 4

Ingredients

12 oz rigatoni 12 oz Italian sausage 1 tablespoon olive oil 4 oz Pancetta cubed 1/2 medium onion diced 3 cloves garlic minced

1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper
1/4 cup white wine or stock of your choice
14.5 oz fire-roasted tomatoes (1 can)
1 cup heavy cream
2 cups fresh baby spinach

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
1/2 teaspoon fresh ground pepper
1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Instructions

Bring a large pot of water to a boil, salt the water. Add the pasta and cook according to package instructions. While the pasta is cooking begin the sauce.

In a large sauté pan, heat the olive oil over medium-high heat. Brown the Italian sausage and pancetta. Remove to a paper towel-lined plate, set aside.


Add the onion, sauté until translucent. Add the garlic and sauté another minute.

Add the wine and fire-roasted tomatoes, simmer and reduce the liquid by half.

Lower the heat, stir in the cream, spinach, salt, pepper, crushed red peppers, Italian sausage, and pancetta. Simmer until the cream is heated and the spinach is wilted. Add the Parmesan cheese and simmer until the sauce has thickened slightly.

Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Drain the pasta, pour the sauce over and stir to coat evenly. Serve immediately.

Chemistry, Pre-vet, Horticulture, Communications, Business, etc. Applicants must explain how they will use their major in the agriculture industry. Applications are due April 1st 2022.

Arnold Oestmann Scholarships – Four \$1,500 scholarships may be awarded to high school seniors intending to further their education at a college, university, or technical school. There is no restriction on the course of study. Applications are due May 1st 2022.

Culinary and Nutrition Scholarship - One \$1,000 to \$2,000 scholarship may be

awarded to a high school senior, or college freshman, sophomore, or junior pursing a degree in the culinary arts or nutrition. Applications are due May 1st 2022.

Ken F. Ebersold Scholarship – Two \$2,000 scholarship may be awarded to an eligible college freshman, sophomore, or junior who is actively and successfully pursuing an undergraduate degree in an agricultural related course of study. Applicants must explain how they will use their major in the agriculture industry. Applications are due May 1st 2022.

Heavy snowfall today could mean digging paths to cattle, scooping outdoor feed bunks or keeping the electricity on for hog barns to maintain heat and ventilation. Just as the pandemic caused people to stock masks and toilet paper, the record-breaking snows of the 1970s prompted our farm to own a snowmobile and tractor-mounted snowblower, the type that moves 4-foot drifts. I rather hope for calm, quiet nights that keep this piece of equipment in the shed.

Ag Spotlight: Hahn History

In Dupage County the amount of farmland is not what it once was, as many farming families have sold their land to developers. However, there are still families that are keeping the farming history alive here in Carol Stream. Chances are you have seen the barn with a black roof and a gold dot and wondered what it means and who owns it. The Hahn's are owners of the

barn on the corner of Lies Rd. and Kuhn Rd. and at one time owned 100 acres of farmland. They were dairy farmers and rotated crops on the land. Chickens and steers

were kept at their property, but the cows were kept on rented land to the east.

As with all farming families the work never stopped. Mark Hahn grew up on this land and started working with his father Albert at a very young age. His father a full-time farmer would do everything on the farm and his mother would collect eggs and pulled weeds from the soybeans. Mark would

always do chores before school, after school, and on the weekends. "It wasn't until I was an adult that I really knew what a weekend was." That hard work and dedication set him up for the successful career and life ahead of him.

In 1965 Albert sold 40 acres of land to district 87. At the time it was just a crop field, but there was once a school called Hahn School that stood on the very land that Glenbard North High School would be built on. A school where Mark Hahn would leave a legacy as a teacher and coach. Mark's mother became a secretary, and he attended as a student. This is where he found his love for wrestling and his high school sweetheart, Karen. Karen's family was also involved with the community. Her father was the Village President and her mother the Village Clerk. After many years as a corporate artist, Karen is now

starting to sell her artwork on Etsy and at local farmers markets. Her art is made of upcycled materials from purses and belts, even painting tarps. She transforms them into wall decor, greeting cards, and jewelry.

Mark and Karen married and raised their two daughters Laura and Emily in the same area, growing up driving the tractors on weekends. His daughters followed in his footsteps, and both became teachers. With family history being very important part of their lives,

his eldest daughter Laura named her son Albert, keeping the name alive for four generations. Laura, like her father, would say the most important family value they have retained is a "strong work ethic" and is "proud to have such a unique family history." The Hahn's have renovated a farmhouse out west where they one day would like to spend most of their time. For now, they will remain in the DuPage County area where family and wrestling are a key part of their lives.

As a coach Mark has instilled the same hard work and ethics with his wrestling team. Knowing the physical benefit of farming he has the wrestlers bail hay on the weekends. That hard work has paid off, winning conference, regional, sectional, and state championships. Incorporating his family history with wrestling, the gold dot is painted on the original barn, but few will



ever know the true meaning. It is a code that Mark shares with only his wrestling team, and a secret that even family members do not know. The barn with the gold dot is on the Hahn property but will forever remain the towns best kept secret among the Glenbard North Wrestlers.
