

In dusk's fading twilight on the 4th, Venus stands 45 degrees from the sun, in Cancer, at magnitude-4.4. A much dimmer Mars can be seen to its upper left. On the 14th, early risers can see a Jupiter/crescent Moon conjunction in the predawn





### Sunrise, set prominent lure to country living

In her earliest drawings, our daughter frequently sketched the sunset and its brilliant hues, including the shades of pink and purple most don't consider. She would compare anything fiery orange to the daily phenomenon. And since acquiring a cell phone in her teenage years, she takes photos of both the sunrise and sunset, often several times a week. She sends Snaps on Snapchat, pairing her photo with a country song for a poetic start or end to the day for her friends.

Our daughter keeps her eves on the horizon, one of the wonders of farm and country life. Out here, we can watch the sun arrive and disappear at a horizon of trees and corn fields without obstruction. Seeing the sun touch the earth ranks one of the most common reasons for living out here. At every cloudless sunrise and sunset, we feel unbound and free in peaceful solitude. For me, the daily moments create a direct connection with Mother Nature that

amplifies the praise that we vocalize in unison at Sunday worship: God is good. But I would understand if any eastbound drivers heading 20 miles to work around 6 a.m. may disagree.

The sun most often determines the length of the workday, outside of late harvest nights by tractor light. Hunters hunt from dawn to dusk. We start scouting fields at daybreak, expecting the sun's length of exposure and heat to advance the crops. Farmers look to the horizon to monitor summer storms approach or drift away with their anxiety dependent on the farm's needs.

In contrast, I enjoy visiting the Chicago suburbs, where my sister-in-law thoughtfully schedules experiences with new shops, parks and beautiful urban landscapes. I soak in doses of the city's culture, energy and especially the delicious food with accessibility. But I miss the horizon and the indescribable liberty that brings. Returning home, I look most forward to reconnecting with it.

Ironically, a day this weekend started with a friend's meme of a country sunrise on Facebook. By evening, a friend texted me a sunset photo taken near the farm. Among my favorite summer sunrises is when I pull eastward into the driveway of the home farm by 6 a.m. The sun's rays cut through the trees of the

pasture and accentuate the fog that hangs low in the river bottom of corn below the farmstead.

In paraphrasing Franklin Roosevelt, we hold to hope and belief in a better life beyond the horizon. I agree as long as we never overlook the good life within it.

# Flank Steak Pinwheels

### **Ingredients**

Basil Arugula Spread 2 cloves garlic chopped 1/2 cup basil chopped 1/2 cup baby arugula 1 tsp lemon zest 1 Tbsp lemon juice 1 1/2 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil 1/2 tsp kosher salt 1/4 tsp freshly ground black pepper

### Flank Steak Pinwheels

11/2 lb flank steak

kosher salt & freshly ground black pepper to taste

### Basil Arugula Spread

1/4 cup shaved parmesan cheese 1/8 lb prosciutto thinly sliced 6 slices provolone cheese Extra virgin olive oil

\*kitchen twine

### Instructions

Basil Arugula Spread: Combine all of the ingredients in the bowl of a food processor fitted with a steel blade and process until well blended.

Flank Steak Pinwheels: Butterfly flank steak, open into one long strip.

Pound until flat between two pieces of wax paper and season with salt and pepper.

Smear basil arugula spread evenly over flank steak and sprinkle with parmesan.

Lay the prosciutto in a single layer, then the provolone cheese slices over that.

Roll up tightly into one long roll and tie off steak in 2 inch intervals. Trim the ends of the string and season with salt.

Slice between the string and place the pinwheels on a sheet tray. Brush the pinwheels on both sides with olive oil.

Preheat grill to med/high heat. Once grill is hot, grill pinwheels 3-4 mins per side.

Cut and remove string and serve.

# **Store Shelves Loaded with Milk Alternatives**

June is National Dairy
Month, a time to celebrate
all the nutritious benefits of
milk, cheese and yogurt. But
what if you don't do dairy?
Whether it's for food preferences, religious purposes
or health reasons, there are
lots of reasons why people
may not partake. Food companies have responded by

developing scores of products to meet those needs, and there are lots of questions about the nutritional benefits of each. There is not enough space here to discuss them all, so lets focus on cereal's best friend: milk. Or milk alternatives, that is.

Lactose-free milk

People who are lactose-

intolerant do not have enough of the lactase enzyme and have trouble digesting lactose (milk sugar). This can cause gas, bloating, diarrhea and nausea. Lactose-free milk is nutritionally the same as regular milk. The only difference is that the lactase enzyme is added to the milk. This enzyme

breaks down the lactose so that people who are lactoseintolerant can drink the milk without adverse effects. Soy milk

Soy milk is made from soybeans that are ground up and soaked. The liquid that is then strained off is the soy milk. Compared to other milk alternatives, soy milk is the most similar to milk in terms of nutrient content. It is usually fortified with calcium and vitamin D and is a good source of protein. Some products are fortified with other nutrients like vitamin E and omega-3 fatty acids. Soy milk naturally contains isoflavones. These are plant chemicals that may help lower "bad" LDL cholesterol.

### Almond milk

Almond milk is made from ground almonds. Since it is made from nuts, it has higher amounts of certain nutrients, most notably vitamin E. However, it is relatively low in protein compared to dairy and soy milk. Not all brands and varieties are fortified, so it may have more or less calcium and vitamin D compared to dairy and soy milk.

### Coconut milk

Coconut milk is made from soaking grated coconut meat. It is a very popular ingredient in Southeast Asian cuisine. In the United States, coconut milk is typically sold in cans. Thickening agents and emulsifiers are usually added so that the milk does

# Black Vulture Depredation Permits Now Available for Impacted Livestock Farmers

The black vulture population has increased in Illinois in recent years, particularly in the southern portion of the state. These birds often prey on young livestock, causing injury and sometimes death, creating major financial losses for some livestock farmers.

Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) has renewed the statewide depredation permit for black vultures from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS). IFB continues to work with USDA Wildlife Services to issue federal subpermits to livestock farmers who are experiencing issues with black vultures on their land. IFB will also continue to work with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) to secure the necessary state permits for farmers seeking approval.

"In an effort to streamline the process and reduce application costs, Illinois Farm Bureau will hold the federal depredation permit for livestock farmers facing problems resulting from black vultures," said IFB President Richard Guebert. "This process will also help farmers quickly receive a state permit from IDNR. We are hopeful that this effort will help reduce conflict between the black vulture population and livestock production."

Black vultures, which have a dark gray head and are aggressive, should not be confused with their larger, less aggressive and red-headed relative, the turkey vulture. Turkey vultures may be found throughout Illinois. Black vultures live in southern regions but are expanding their range further north, creating depredation problems for farmers.

As migratory birds, black vultures are protected by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, state laws and regulations, therefore, they can't be killed or destroyed without a migratory bird depredation permit from USFWS and a class B nuisance wildlife control permit from IDNR.

"The Illinois Department of Natural Resources is continuing to cooperate with the Illinois Farm Bureau and USDA Wildlife Services to develop a simple process for livestock producers to receive federal and state permits for removing black vultures that can be harmful to their operations," IDNR Director Natalie Phelps Finnie said. "I am glad we were able to continue the process created two years ago that provides relief to Illinois stockmen while still meeting our obligation to conserve protected species."

IFB will issue sub-permits as a benefit to livestock

farmers who are experiencing problems with black vultures and assist in securing IDNR's required permit. The sub-permit is available to livestock farmers facing depredation of commercial livestock, which includes cattle, horses, sheep, goats and swine.

Approved applicants will be allowed a maximum of three birds, determined after consultation with USDA Wildlife Services. Following the consultation and approval, a state permit will also be provided by IDNR. Applicants must agree to follow all rules and regulations required by USFWS in the IFB statewide permit and the requirements of the IDNR permit. Illinois Farm Bureau,


IDNR, USFWS and USDA Wildlife Services created this permit process in 2021 to assist livestock producers.

Interested livestock producers may request a sub-permit application by contacting Illinois Farm Bureau Associate Director of Commodity and Livestock, Tasha Bunting, at tbunting@ilfb.org.

not separate. This is a natural process but often mistaken for spoilage.

Coconut is one of the only plant sources of saturated fats (normally found in animal foods like meat and dairy). Coconut milk is high in saturated fat, and too much saturated fat can lead to cardiovascular issues. Some people question whether the saturated fat found in coconut products is as bad as we think. This is a hot topic of research, but at this point, many health organizations (FDA, World Health Organization, American Heart Association, Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, etc.) recommend only consuming small amounts until we know more. Rice milk

Rice milk is made mostly from brown rice and generally tastes sweeter than cow's milk. Compared to other milks, it is higher in carbohydrate but low in protein. Not all brands are fortified with nutrients, so be sure to read the Nutrition Facts label.

In sum, soy, almond, rice and coconut milk are all lactose- and dairy-free and can be enjoyed by people who are lactose-intolerant. Since they are plant-based, they are also good options for vegans and vegetarians. Soy, almond and rice milk do not have significant saturated fat or cholesterol, making them heart-healthy choices. Soy and almond milk are also good choices for people with diabetes, as they tend to be lower in carbohydrates.

Milk alternatives come in a variety of flavors as well as light and regular versions. Fat, sugar and calorie content differ depending on flavor, brand and whether it is light or regular.

As always, be sure to read the Nutrition Facts label and make up any differences (like protein) in other areas of your diet.
