Annual Call for Nominees to Serve on Farm Bureau Board

Each year, in accordance with the bylaws of the DuPage County Farm Bureau, qualified Regular (MM) Members are given the opportunity to submit their names for consideration as nominees to fill the three positions on the Board of Directors elected for a three-year term. Qualified Regular (MM) Members are those who have a substantial financial interest in the production of agricultural products and are engaged in agricultural production as a farm owner or operator, per the membership guidelines of this Farm Bureau. Regular members interested in serving, who meet the qualifications for director, are encouraged to contact the Executive Director at their earliest convenience to discuss the nomination procedure. Quali-

fications for a director are as follows:

Article III, Section 2, Qualifications

A member of the Board of Directors must be a voting member of this Farm Bureau in good standing and must, at the time of his or her election, be a resident of the county or have substantial farming interests located within the county and must be eligible to hold office under the provisions of Article II, Section 1 of these bylaws. For the purpose of making nominations to the Board of Directors, the county-at-large shall be regarded as the unit of representation. All decisions regarding the qualifications of candidates will be made by the Board of Directors. All the incumbents are eligible for re-election. Nomi-

nation forms are available at the Farm Bureau Office in Carol Stream for qualified voting members interested in having their name placed in the nomination. Said members are asked to contact the Executive Director, who will provide the necessary form upon request, and assist applicants with its completion. No qualified voting member may be nominated without his or her permission, and the submission of this form. Responsibilities of those elected as members of the Board of Directors include attendance at the regular monthly board meetings, participation on at least one standing committee and on special committees as required, attendance at IFB District Meetings, and participation in other volunteer activities conducted by Farm Bureau to promote agriculture and improve the

profitability of farming in Illinois. If you are interested in submitting your name for nomination, your application must be in the Farm Bureau Office no later than Noon, Friday, September 15, 2023.

Did You Know?

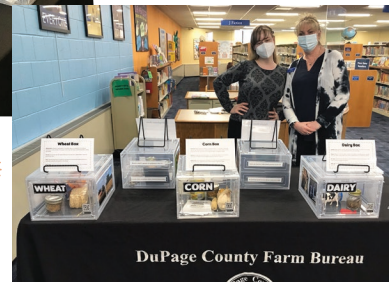

Transport by Trailer College move-in successful minus the pigs

The gal in the neighboring dorm room rented a U-Haul to transport her belongings to college. Other families had minivans with the back seats removed for their students. We had a pickup truck pulling a livestock trailer that stated the name and location of our farm.

I avoided eye contact

with the upper-classmen helpers as my dad removed the pin, lifted the bar lock assembly and swung open the rear gate. With ease, the trailer held my bookshelf, mini-fridge, microwave and television with built-in VCR. I grabbed a lamp and headed to my second-floor room. Perhaps the volunteers didn't realize this rig hauled pigs most other days of the year.

For six consecutive years, livestock trailers hauled my brother or me to college. Later, they moved us to new homes. The trailers were "special-event spotless," or as clean as possible with a pressure washer and relentless focus on the toughest layers of manure. We cleaned the trailers with the same precision for a shining appearance

at the county 4-H fair livestock shows.

My college move-in experience merely represented the norm for a farm kid: Farmers maximizing the potential of their farm equipment. As a child, Mom swam in a large, round livestock water tank, which served the cattle when she and her brothers were done with it. Old tractor tires became sandboxes. The hayrack doubled as a float in the homecoming parade. We used the farm shop for our wedding reception.

By my senior year, I appreciated the practicality of our pig-turned-furniture hauler.

Now, our kids witness my tolerance of embarrassment. The minivan (my farm car) has mudflaps and rugged, all-terrain tires. I take an insulated delivery bag into the local pizza places. Mistaken for DoorDash, I explain the bag keeps both pizza and field meals warm in transit to rural locations.

So if you see a livestock trailer backing with ease to the neighboring sidewalk, admire the skill. Then, just realize it's likely not a cow moving in next door, but rather someone with some unique resources potentially sharable with friends.

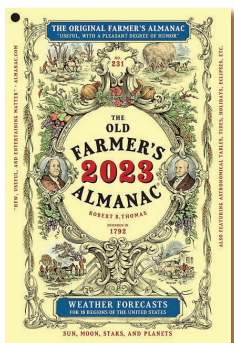
Sky Watch:

Tomato & Vidalia Onion Pie

Ingredients

1 pie crust – from scratch or store-bought
2 large tomatoes, sliced thin
1 large Vidalia Onion, sliced thin
1-2 tsp salt and pepper
1 Tbsp olive oil
2 Tbsp fresh basil, chopped
1 cup grated cheddar or mozzarella cheese
1/2 cup grated Parmesan
1/3 cup mayonnaise

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees
Slice tomatoes and lay them on a cutting board with paper towel

Sprinkle them with salt, cover them with more paper towel, and allow them to dry for 15 minutes

Combine the mayonnaise and two cheeses in a bowl and set aside

Layer your tomato and Vidalia Onion slices in the pie crust, alternating layers

Sprinkle the mix with pepper and drizzle olive oil over the vegetables

Sprinkle on chopped basil and then spread cheese/mayo mix on top, add extra basil on top

Bake pie for 40-45 minutes or until golden brown

How to Grow Tropical Ginger for At Home Spice

Growing fresh vegetables, fruits, and herbs in the backyard can seem like a lot of work, but at the end of the season, the bountiful, tasty harvest is worth it.

The International Herb Association named ginger (*Zingiber officinale*) the 2023 "Herb of the Year". This is one herb that is not typically grown in Illinois gardens and is often easier to buy at the grocery store. However, ginger can be grown successfully in Illinois home gardens with a little extra planning and care.

The gnarly, tan rhizome, or underground stem, of ginger has a strong, spicy flavor and is grown for a variety of culinary uses, including baked goods, teas, and soups. When used fresh, ginger is considered a culinary herb. When ground or powdered, it is recognized as a spice.

Ginger that is commercially produced for culinary use is grown in tropical climates, which offers the plant 8 to 10 months of growth before the harvest of the mature rhizome. It will not survive outdoors in temperatures below 30 °F, which makes it an annual plant in Illinois.

Researchers with University of Illinois Extension and Western Illinois University are

currently exploring how to commercially produce ginger in Illinois to give specialty crop growers a new high-value product that can grow in high tunnels. Find out more about the project at go.illinois.edu/GingerCrop.

Plant ginger in at least a 15" diameter container to move outdoors when temperatures are consistently between 70° and 80°F. When starting rhizomes in containers, the top of the rhizomes



months and allow adequate time for the rhizome to mature, start ginger plants indoors in February or March. Purchase sets, or small sections of the certified disease-free rhizome for planting, from local garden centers or nurseries, or online seed companies. Ginger roots found in the grocery store receive an

should barely be covered with soil to avoid rot. Also, allow space at the top of the container to add more soil as the rhizome pushes up. Detailed planting directions can be found online to ensure a successful crop.

Ginger will grow in part-shade to full sun and will not tolerate overly wet, water-

logged soils or completely drying out. Brown leaf tips are an indicator the plant either needs more water, or it is receiving too much sunlight. Yellowing foliage is a sign that supplemental fertilization is needed.

In addition to growing for culinary use, ginger also makes a beautiful ornamental plant in any garden. With a clump-forming habit, reaching 3 feet tall, ginger's strappy, bright green foliage adds a tropical flair to a garden landscape or patio container.

Baby ginger, or small sections of the rhizome, can be harvested after four months of growth. These immature sections have the same taste but are not as fibrous since they lack the tough outer skin of a mature rhizome and can get damaged easily. They can be stored in a freezer for several months to enjoy later.

To harvest mature sections, bring them inside before temperatures drop below freezing and wait until the leaves turn brown and dry out around November, and then carefully dig the rhizome from the soil. If planning to overwinter the plants, move the container indoors before freezing temperatures. Once inside, the plant will go dormant for the winter, losing all the foliage until temperatures warm in spring.

As the International Herb Association's Herb of the Year, ginger is both beautiful in the garden and valuable in the kitchen. Also, consider planting past winners in your garden: violet (*Viola*), parsley (*Petroselinum*), anise hyssop (*Agastache* ssp.), coriander/cilantro (*Coriandrum sativum*), and savory (*Saturea* ssp.)

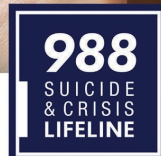

Master Gardener Program Offers Online Training

For 48 years, University of Illinois Extension Master Gardeners have measured success by gardens planted, insects identified, produce harvested, and the millions of hours volunteers have logged by helping others learn to grow.

From farms and small towns to suburbs and the inner city, more than 2,600 volunteers statewide put their mission of helping others learn to grow into practice by providing gardening education and outreach in their communities. Take your love of gardening to the next level by becoming a Master Gardener in 2023.

This year, there are two online training options – self-paced or hybrid with live sessions.

“Our online training is a

great opportunity for folks who need more flexibility to participate,” says Extension State Master Gardener Specialist Candice Anderson. “Both options have self-paced components that can be completed at your own pace.”

Both training options may be taken from the comfort of home on a desktop, laptop, or tablet. Participants will be introduced to in-depth horticulture content through 13 modules, including soils and fertilizers, plant diseases, entomology, pest management, organic gardening, and more. The training includes videos, a manual, reading materials, and quizzes. A strong internet connection is highly recommended.

After completing the training, volunteers participate in educational programs

in their communities. Those opportunities may include speaking at garden clubs, civic groups, or schools, answering calls or emails at garden help desks, establishing demonstration gardens that serve as educational tools, and educating citizens on how to establish community gardens.

The self-paced course starts October 2 and can be completed in 14 weeks with approximately four to six hours of weekly work. The course costs \$300, and registration is open until September 11.

The hybrid course starts September 12 and includes 12 weeks of hybrid online materials and in-person sessions on Tuesday mornings. The live sessions may be accessed remotely or in person at an Extension office, depending on the local requirements. Registration is open until September 1. The cost is set by the county providing the training.

Both Master Gardener training programs are coordinated by Extension staff at the county

level. Training options, dates, and availability may vary by county. For more information or to fill out an application form, contact your local Illinois Extension Office at go.illinois.edu/ExtensionOffice.

It’s truly remarkable.” In all his years of farming Ron has seen some incredible innovations. The GPS in his computerized equipment ensures his rows are straight, allowing him to pay more attention to the operation of the equipment. In the spring and fall, the Frieders family work incredibly long hours to make the most of days with favorable weather.

Ron joined the DuPage County Farm Bureau in 1972. He currently serves as the Treasurer of the DuPage County Farm Bureau Board. He believes in the organization’s grass roots’ efforts to promote and educate the public and our legislators about agriculture. In a time when most consumers are several generations removed from the farm, it is important to connect the farmer to the consumer. Ron states, “As farmers, we live on the land and drink the water. We eat our meat and produce. We want to protect the earth with its plants and animals and grow the best quality products to feed the world.”
